I WAS THERE

Note: This is one of the special "I was There" series recommended by Joe Martino for The Engineer each month during his absence.

It was back in 1940 when, at the age of 27, and as co-founder, Chief Engineer and General Manager of Burlington Instrument Corp. of Burlington, Iowa, that the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) was providing rural areas throughout the U.S. with electrical power sources. The first TVA plant provided in desert area was in Desert Springs Valley, NE of Tombstone. As my company had received a contract for the proper controls for four diesel engine-generator power units installed there, we built the required voltage regulators, engine load controls, plus a special frequency regulator to provide constant 60-cycle frequency for electrical clocks throughout the system.

We ordered a grandfather-type highly-accurate master clock, built the necessary voltage, current and frequency regulators, and when completed, my wife and I drove to Douglas and out into the desert, where I spent several days installing and adjusting the system to give rural customers the same power as obtained in major metropolitan areas. The swing of the master clock pendulum regulated the governors of the four diesel engines to provide the constant 60-cycle frequency required to maintain electric time.

It was always a joy to receive such a letter of appreciation as the one attached, from the Sulphur Valley Plant (1487) Superintendent, Mike Bennett.
