

An interview with Bill and Jackie Lockwood

Bill and Jackie Lockwood have been married for 52 years and have three grown children and four grandchildren. Bill is the founder of LJB Engineers and Architects and CON/SPAN Bridge Systems. He is currently Senior Vice President of CONTECH Bridge Solutions, where he is partially retired. Jackie served as the Director of Marketing and Public Relations for the Dayton Opera from 1963 to 1988, and from 1989 to 2002 she was the Vice President of Marketing for CON/SPAN Bridge Systems. Currently Jackie serves on the boards of the Muse Machine and Dayton Opera. Bill is on the Governing Board for the Engineering & Science Foundation, the Board of Trustees for the National Composite Center, and the Advisory Board for the University of Cincinnati, Department of Civil Engineering. Bill is one of only eleven Fellows of the Engineers Club (see list at left) and holds several U.S. and foreign patents related to structural engineering and composites.



What attracted you?

Bill: During the years we were building our businesses, the professional environment of the Club provided our firms with an ideal setting for lunch meetings with clients, staff meeting, and meetings with business associates. The Club was also useful when we sponsored seminar meetings; we were able to hold the meetings in the auditorium, and we brought in nationally recognized experts as speakers.
