Elwyn Treat: 1916 - 2000

Elwyn L. Treat, long-time Engineers Club Member and resident of Kettering passed away Monday, December 18, 2000, at his home surrounded by loving family members. Mr. Treat was 84. He was born January 17, 1916, in Jasper, Michigan. Mr. Treat grew up in Flint, Michigan, where he developed an early interest in aviation. He attended Flint Junior College and later the University of Michigan, from which he earned an aeronautical engineering degree in 1939. Mr. Treat then came to Dayton, Ohio, where he began his career as a civilian project engineer at Wright Field. He became Civilian Chief of Production and Procurement and had responsibility over several bomber projects, including the B-17, B-25, B-26, B-36, and B-52. Mr. Treat retired from Wright-Patterson AFB in 1975.

In 1941, Mr. Treat married his college sweetheart, Norene Jadwin, and had 35 wonderful years with her before she passed away in 1977. In 1979, Mr. Treat married a second special person, Carol Howard, with whom he spent 21 loving years. In 1950, he became a charter member of Christ United Methodist Church. Mr. Treat joined the Dayton Engineers Club in 1940, and has maintained an active Membership in the Club, including continued involvement in the Barn Gang. He was a 50-year member of the YMCA. Mr. Treat engaged himself generously in providing assistance to many people in the community. Mr. Treat is survived by three sisters and one brother; his wife, Carol; his children, Ward Treat, Ned Treat, Joli Tapp, Dianne Howard, Denny Howard, and Elaine Stanley; 13 grandchildren; and one great-grandchild. A Service of Celebration was held Thursday, December 21, 2000, at Christ United Methodist Church on Shroyer Road. His friends at the Engineers Club will miss him greatly.
